Many of you may know me as Vice President of the S Jay Levy Fellowship, and Psychology and Biology student from City College. What you may not know is that I'm also an artist, and the last year has brought some accomplishments I am excited to share with you. The pandemic hit my senior year at CCNY, and I anticipated that there would be no quick fix. I felt like, as a recent grad, it was the worst time to enter the job market. I decided to further my education, so I applied to the MFA program at The New York Academy of Art, with a major in sculpture and minor in anatomy. I was fortunate to receive the President's Scholarship, awarded to one incoming student per year.

This intensive program has not only improved my technique as a sculptor, but has given me the confidence to see myself as a professional artist. I achieved a few career milestones this year. This summer, I was able to install my first public work in upstate New York

at the Cherry Valley Sculpture Trail, which was on view from June through October. The piece was purchased by a private collector, and now overlooks Otsego Lake. It was the largest piece I have sold, and I'm so glad it has a new home. I was also selected to participate in The New York Academy's fundraiser show, Artists for Artists, hosted by Sotheby's Auction House. It was an honor to exhibit among so many notable artists, including Tracy Emin, Peter Saul, and Tim Okamura. My piece was sold, and the proceeds go to scholarship funding at the New York Academy.

During summer, I accepted a position at the Studio at Corning Museum of Glass, as an instructor in the Make Your Own Glass program. This was my first full time teaching position, and I was grateful to be a part of such a supportive community. I returned to Corning this fall as a teaching assistant to the Senior Programs Manager Richard Whiteley. I look forward to assisting Richard again for the winter intensive, which is attended by glass artists from all over the globe.

The last milestone I'll share is a unique experience offered by my school, and something that really brings my

education experience full circle. As an artist who works with the figure, having a deep understanding of human anatomy is key. I was a sculptor before I started at City College, and wanting to learn more about anatomy was actually what inspired me to enroll in a Bachelors program. My undergraduate classes in biology and anatomy really galvanized my enthusiasm for learning about the body. Now, I get to take my education one step further through the partnership with the New York Academy of Art and Drexel School of Medicine. Drexel welcomes the art students into their gross anatomy labs, and allows us to study from the same cadavers studied by the medical students. The program was actually featured in National Geographic a few years ago. This opportunity feels like a culmination of what I worked so hard for at City



College, and I am so excited to see how this improves my skills sculpting the figure.
